Organises a three day workshop on

"Documentation and Development of Cultural Heritage: Methodological Approaches" (7, 8, 9 September, 2022).

Concept Note:

The UNESCO defines Cultural Heritage as "artefacts, monuments, a group of buildings and sites, museums that have a diversity of values including symbolic, historic, artistic, aesthetic, ethnological or anthropological, scientific and social significance. It includes tangible heritage (movable, immobile and underwater), intangible cultural heritage (ICH) embedded into cultural, and natural heritage artefacts, sites or monuments". Taking this as a point of departure for understanding Naga Cultural Heritage, the Directorate of Art and Culture, Government of Nagaland, in collaboration with the Centre for Naga Tribal Language Studies, Nagaland University, Meriema, is organising a workshop from 7-9, September 2022 at Nagaland University, Kohima Campus to look at new and emerging methodological approaches in the study of Cultural Heritage, encapsulating both its tangile and intangible avatars. The three day workshop will revisit and reevaluate existing notions of Cultural Heritage, and help to carve ways at situating Naga Cultural Heritage in the larger context of decolonization that is in practice all over the world. To this end, the workshop will comprise of interactive sessions with anthropologists, linguists, folklorists, historians and archaeologists and "notes from the field".
